Proposed Eisteddfod Site, Castle Meadows and Llanfoist, Abergavenny

Archaeological Desk Based Assessment

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Summary

Following the approval of a specification by the Curatorial Division of the Glamorgan and Gwent Archaeological Trust, in February 2014, Archaeology Wales was commissioned by Monmouthshire County Council to carry out an Archaeological Desk Based Assessment. The aim of this assessment was to examine the archaeological potential of two sites at Abergavenny and Llanfoist, which are being considered as the location for the National Eisteddfod in August 2016.

The proposed main Eisteddfod site is located on the Abergavenny side of the Usk river on the Castle Meadows. The proposed second site (Maes B) is located directly opposite on the Llanfoist bank of the river. The Abergavenny site known as Castle Meadows is floodplain land located close to the medieval castle and Roman fort location. It is also overlooked by two Historic Gardens. Research has shown that the landscape has changed very little since the nineteenth-century.

The only visible features on this site are probably best interpreted as natural riverine landscaping caused by episodic flooding of the Usk. The Llanfoist site comprises riverside grazing land and enclosed fields with a modern fenced sheepfold located in the southern end of a field. A possible hollow way was located on the eastern side of the site.

Crynodeb

Fe gomisiynwyd Archaeology Wales gan Gyngor Sir Mynwy i baratoi asesiad archeolegol ar ddau safle yn y Fenni a Llanfoist. Pwrpas yr asesiad oedd gweld a oedd safleoedd neu nodweddion archeolegol ar faes posib yr Eisteddfod Genedlaethol 2016.

Mae'r brîf safle ar Gaeau'r Castell ar ochr ogleddol yr afon Wysg, tra bod safle posib Maes B ar ochr ddeheuol yr afon yn Llanfoist. Gorlifdir naturiol sydd ar y prif safle gydag olion sianelu hynafol a thystiolaeth o lifogydd o'r afon. Nid oes newidiadau mawr wedi bod i'r tirwedd ers y bedwaredd ganrif ar bymtheg. Mae yna gerddi hanesyddol a henebion cofrestredig wrth ymyl y safle ond nid oes nodweddion amlwg i'w gweld ar y safle ei hun. Mae safle Llanfoist yn cynnwys tir gwastraff ar lannau'r afon a chaeau amaethyddol yn agos i waith trin carthffosiaeth. Heblaw am ceufford posib ar ochr ddwyreiniol y safle nid oes nodweddion amlwg i'w gweld.

1. Introduction

In February 2014 Archaeology Wales was commissioned by Monmouthhshire County Council to examine the archaeological potential of two potential sites (fig. 2) near Abergavenny that are being considered as the location for the National Eisteddfod, 2016 (AW Project Number: 2203; Planning Authority: Monmouthshire County Council; Planning Reference: Pre Planning). The proposed sites of the Eisteddfod are located on the northern and southern banks of the river Usk at Abergavenny and Llanfoist (NGR: SN 37420 19390; 49m AOD; NGR: SO 29671 13554; 48m AOD; fig. 1).

This assessment included a site visit, an examination of relevant documentary and cartographic sources, aerial photographs and an evaluation of the relevant Historic Environment Record (HER). The work was carried out by Dr Iestyn Jones in March 2014.

2. Site Description

2.1 Location, Topography, Geology

Site A, at Castle Meadows, is an oval shaped area of grassland (48m AOD) measuring approximately 1.2km east to west by 250m north to south, located north of the river Usk and south-west of Abergavenny Castle. The level floodplain is crossed by a number of footpaths and the river Gafenni's confluence with the Usk is towards the narrowing eastern limit of the site. In addition to the Gafenni and the Cibi stream, which joins the Gafenni near its confluence, a number of outfalls and drains cross the site between the southern limit of Abergavenny's buildings and the river Usk.

Site B is located opposite Site A, on the southern bank of the Usk on land formerly associated with Llanfoist Farm. North of the access road to the sewage farm the site comprises two enclosed fields and a third field fringing the meander of the river Usk. The western most field is roughly triangular measuring 221m (north-south) by 150m (east-west). It lies at approximately 50m AOD on its western side, and drops down to 47m AOD on its north-eastern corner. The adjacent field to its east is roughly 'L' shaped and measures approximately 280m (south-east to north-west) by 210m north-east to south-west). It is level and is located at approximately 46mAOD. This field's former south-eastern corner has been developed as part of the sewage farm. The 'U' shaped easterly field is 140m maximum width and surrounds the sewage works on its northern eastern and southern side. It also defines the edge of the meander in the river Usk as its course changes towards the south.

South of the sewage farm access road small fields bordering the A465 consist of a 17m wide triangular shaped field (51m AOD) sloping west to east that is 234m long (east to west). Two narrow fields located to the east of this field are combined to form a 300m long (east to west) and approximately 50m wide (north to south).

All of Site A and the majority of Site B comprises clay, silt, sand and gravel alluvium overlying Maughans Formation interbedded argillaceous rocks and sandstone. These are freely draining floodplain soils. The western most field in Site B comprises glacio-fluvial deposits of Devensian sand and gravel, slightly acidic freely draining loamy deposits overlying identical bedrock.

2.2 Historical Background

Abergavenny's name derives from the Welsh language's description of its location at the confluence of the river Gafenni with the Usk. The river Gafenni's name has been interpreted as meaning either 'river of the blacksmiths' or 'river of the ironworks' (Gobannia) with a possible reference to the iron minerals in the area (Owen and Morgan 2007, 6-7). Neolithic and Bronze Age activity in this immediate area is reflected in a number of artefacts recovered on both sides of the Usk (see HER below). In the first century AD, before AD 60, a Roman fort (*Gobannium*) was built on the flat summit of the bluff above the confluence, and three phases of military occupation have been demonstrated archaeologically (Wiles 2004). The listing of the fort at Abergavenny along with that at Usk (*Burrium*) in the Antonine Itinerary suggests that it was a significant site (Arnold and Davies 2000, 63).

Near to the site of the Roman fort a Motte and Bailey castle was built by Hamelin de Ballon, in 1087. A Benedictine Priory was also established nearby some time later. In 1175 the castle became the supposed location of William de Braose murder of a Welsh lord, Seisyllt ap Dyfnwal, of Castell Arnallt. The castle was later destroyed by the Welsh lord of Caerleon in 1182 (Whittle 1992, 109). The town was extended to the north and west and walled during the thirteenth-century. The town possessed 230 burgesses between 1256-59, but was sacked in 1404 by Owain Glyndwr (Soulsby 1983, 67).

Following the sixteenth-century Dissolution the Priory Church became the Parish Church of St Mary and the Herbert and Gunter estates profited from the distribution of monastic lands. During the eighteenth-century the quiet town appears to be described as a thermal spa health resort with an established flannel and tanning industry. The nineteenth-century saw the town profiting from its proximity to the canal system to Brecon, tramroads to Hereford and the railway network.

Llanfoist, located on the southern banks of the Usk, is described in the Historic Landscape Characterisation as:

'A small rural settlement based on a medieval parochial centre: initially characterised by a loose dispersed scatter of farms 'focused' on medieval parish church, which is at present largely dominated by twentieth century housing. A core of nineteenth century terraced cottages and detached villas also survive. The area's historic associations include links to (Industrialist) Crawshay Bailey, who died in 1872 in retirement at Llanfoist House and is commemorated by a memorial in the village' (GGAT and Cadw 2014).

3. Desk-based Assessment Results

3.1 HER Data (Fig. 3)

A search of the Historic Environment Record (HER) within a 2km radius of the sites was undertaken and the results are appended. Although 275 listed buildings, 6 Scheduled Ancient Monuments (SAMs) and 6 Parks and Gardens are recorded within the 2km search area (see Appendix 1) it is likely that with the short-term, temporary use of Site A and B only a small number have the potential to be impacted.

Three Scheduled Ancient Monument (SAMs) lie adjacent to Site A. Abergavenny Castle, a Grade I listed building (LB 86811) and Scheduled Ancient Monument (SAM: MM056), is located on the northern boundary of Site A. The castle ruins are built on the summit of the eleventh-century Motte and Bailey. The castle forms the focus for a Historic Park and Garden (Gt9). This Grade II listed park contains the Grade 1 listed castle ruins within a setting of a landscaped nineteenth-century walk and gardens.

The site of *Gobannium* Roman Fort lies to the immediate west of the castle park and is a Scheduled Ancient Monument (SAM: MM193). A Roman ditch was discovered

during archaeological excavations in the 1960s in an orchard in Flannel Street (PRN 03776g).

The third SAM is Abergavenny (or Usk) Bridge (SAM: MM010) on the far western edge of Site A. Although the bridge was reputedly first built by Jasper Tudor in the fifteenth-century the extant structure appears to be later, possibly seventeenth century. It has been widened and strengthened since the nineteenth century.

The northwestern side of site A is overlooked by Linda Vista Gardens (PG (Gt) 59 (MON)). This is a small public park which is Grade II listed. This well preserved and richly planted nineteenth and twentieth century public park originated as a private garden.

Bailey Park Registered Historic Park and Garden (PGW (Gt) 60 (MON)) is located 530m north-northwest of Site A in the Pen-y-Pound area of Abergavenny. This is a surviving Grade II listed late Victorian public park laid out by the Iron master Crawshay Bailey c. 1884.

On the southern banks of the Usk, Abergavenny New Cemetery Historic Park and Garden (Gt37) is located 530m northwest of the western boundary of Site B. This is a Grade II listed late nineteenth-century landscaped cemetery.

A medieval Fulling Mill is recorded within the HER (PRN 03792g) at NGR SO300138. This is within the Site A boundary and south of Mill Street Industrial Estate. No further details are recorded (see Site Visit below).

Recorded artefacts found within the boundary of Site A include a possible Roman or Medieval ceramic sherd recovered during the 1980s (PRN 03779g) at NGR SO298139. The proximity of this find spot to the Roman fort and medieval castle may explain this. Within the boundary of Site B near the sewage works entrance Bronze Age flint arrowheads (PRN 03974g) were discovered at NGR SO 29801330. The material is of similar date to that recovered at Flannel Street, to the north of Site A, in a 1960s excavation.

3.2 Map Regression: SITE A (Figs. 4-11)

<u>1845 Abergavenny Tithe Map</u> (Fig.4)

The major difference between the current landscape and the one indicated on the 1845 tithe map is that of a channel or sub-channel that bows north from the Usk approximately 100m east of the bridge from Llanfoist before rejoining the main river 300m further east. This cuts through grassland named The Castle Meadows (475) which was owned by the Earl of Abergavenny but leased by Blaenavon Iron Co. The field to east of Castle Meadows is labelled Willows and Rough Pasture (487) which was also leased by Blaenavon Iron Co. A faint footpath or track is shown running between the town and Llanfoist Bridge north of the channel.

The nameless sub-rectangular grass field near the town (possibly 476) appears to have been owned by Ferdinand William Hanbury although the numbering on the map is faded in this area. Enclosure 485 is named Castle Parade Slope with the

Castle located to the north of this field. The eastern-most field appears to be numbered 643 and was a nameless area of grassland. Fields 482 and 486, if the faded map numbers were correctly deciphered, were untraceable on the apportionment. The Usk river formation east of the Gafenni confluence appears to have been different to today with a gravel bank located within the river channel near the bend.

<u>1881 OS Map 1:2,500</u> (Fig. 5)

The 1881 map indicates that the channel on the western side of Castle Meadows had partially silted up since the tithe map was surveyed, forming ox-bow pools and a single confluence near a gravel beach. The field labeled 476 on the previous tithe map is shown as being defined on its western, northern and southern edge by two drains one of which issues from the area near Byefield Lane and the other from the centre of the meadow. These two channels eventually become one that runs into the Usk near the Gafenni confluence. Fields to the south of Tudor Street are shown planted with trees with some terraced housing and gardens at their northern end. Linda Vista garden is clearly labeled, as is the Castle. The curvilinear site of the former Town Wall is marked curving northwest to southeast from the High Street cutting across Castle Street and running towards the Castle remains. A corn Mill is shown to the south-east of the Castle and a Tannery is located east of this. A footbridge is shown across the Gafenni river whilst another footbridge appears to span a channel from the Usk within the south-eastern field. A Corn Mill is shown adjacent to the Gafenni river northern footbridge. A footpath is shown running along the Usk and east towards the Gafenni River as well west from Byefield Lane towards Llanfoist Bridge.

<u>1920 Map 1:2,500 (Fig. 6)</u>

Many of the trees marked on the southern edge of the town on the 1881 map have been cleared by 1920 and there appear to be developments south of the site of the town wall within an area called Castle Ward. The ox-bow pools within Castle Meadows are no longer shown, although a "Def" legend with a dotted line shows that an undefined channel of some description existed along its former course. The drains described in the previous map are unchanged as are the footpaths. With reference to the 1901 map (see Site B below) it is curious that a Urinal is located near the bank of the Usk near the junction of two footpaths west of the Gafenni confluence.

<u>1973-1986 Epoch map 1:2,500</u> (Fig. 7)

The undefined stream channel within the western Castle Meadows continues along the same course although it seems to emerge near a spring at its northern end. A wider linear footpath, which is raised in some parts, runs across this channel from northeast to south west, south of Linda Vista garden. Three car parks have been constructed to the south of Tudor Street and entered from Byfield Lane, and a Nursery is located to the east of these. The northern branch of the drain seen in the former map forms a pond near one of the car parks. Several stands of trees are now shown within the Castle Meadows.

3.3 Map Regression : Site B

1844 Llanfoist Tithe Map (Fig. 8)

Site B lies on the southern banks of the Usk within Llanfoist parish. The tithe map of 1844 shows land that was leased from the Earl of Abergavenny and farmed by Llanfoist Farm. The fields are located between the farm buildings and the bend in the river. The complete fields within Site B boundary include Part of Park Vach (106: little park), Ynis Vawr (108: Large Island), A Gil Ynis (109: Corner Island, The Lained (107 and 107a: Narrow strips of grazing, from Welsh Llain). Parts of field to the south include Worlod Canol (110: Middle Meadow), Fourteen Acres (111), Wern (114: swamp) and Cae Pwll Back (116: Little or rear pool field). The use of the word Ynys or Island to describe some fields presumably indicates that they were flooded from time to time. Although the shape of the Usk's banks do not differ dramatically from the present day there is some evidence to suggest that the western end of 107 has been eroded since 1844.

A small east to west track or roadway leads from Llanfoist farm towards Park Vach (sic) field (106).

<u>1881 OS Map 1:2,500</u> (Fig.9)

The 1881 map appears to show a landscape that remains little changed since 1844, although the detail in the north-western corner show that some erosion of the Usk bank has occurred. The only boundary shift appears to be in the north-eastern area defining field 107a on the tithe map. By 1881 this field encompassed the entire south-eastern bank of the Usk within Site B.

<u>1901 OS Map 1:2,500 (Fig. 10)</u>

The 1901 shows that between 1888 and 1901 Abergavenny Corporation constructed Sewage Filter Beds and tanks in a field 760m south-east of Llanfoist Farm. A footbridge spans the Usk on the far eastern side of Site B and a path leads from the bridge crossing point towards the Filter Beds and tanks. The fields otherwise appear unchanged from 1888.

1965-1971 OS Map 1:2,500 (Fig. 11)

Minor changes can be observed from the 1901 map, including the splitting of a single western field into two and the building of a sheepfold at the end of the small lane to the east of Llanfoist Farm. An area of marshy ground is also seen in the centre of a field to the east of the original Llanfoist Farm.

A number of major changes have, however, taken place in the surrounding fields during the mid-twentieth century. Llanfoist Farm has been moved 480m south-east and its former location has been replaced by a large Engineering Works. This development can be demonstrated post-1920 (see fig. above) although the farm buildings can be seen in the original location alongside a large building in the 1951 aerial photograph (see fig. AP1). The HER indicates that the Engineering Works were built in 1943 for the production of Aviation Radiators during WWII (Coflein 2014). To the east of Site B a Sewage Works has been built within the southern section of the former Llanfoist fields and an Aqueduct is located along the footbridge seen in 1901. This Sewage Farm is not seen on the 1964 map and it is likely therefore that it was a new development in late 1964/1965. The current

Sewage Works appear to have been further developed and enlarged since the original 1960s development. The A465 (Heads of the Valleys Rd) bisects the fields south of the new Sewage Farm. This road does not appear on the 1938-1953 map and therefore appears to have built originally between 1953 and 1964.

3.4. Aerial Photographs (Figs. 12-13)

1951 (Fig. 12)

The 1951 aerial photograph shows Llanfoist Farm in its original location. It does however show a large factory type construction to its north-west. This is presumably the Lang Pen Company's Engineering Works for the construction of WWII radiators. This photograph also shows the Sewage Filter Beds that predate the later Sewage Works. The crop patterns appear to show a possible field boundary on the north-eastern side of Site B (south of the Usk) that is not reflected on the post tithe maps.

1969: (Fig. 13)

This photograph shows the relocated Llanfoist Farm and the considerably expanded Engineering Works built over the original farm location. The Sewage Works are clearly shown, as is a new road bridge and the east to west aligned A465 south of the Engineering Works.

3.5 Site Visit (Figs. 14-19)

A site visit was conducted in dry and bright conditions on 13th March and 1st of April, 2014.

Site A (figs 14-15 and 18): This area is the proposed main Eisteddfod site. The general area is relatively level or gently undulating flood plain comprising grasses with ponds, drains and scattered 'wet carr' woodland. A number of earthworks in some areas can probably be explained as episodic flooding of the Usk over a period of several hundred years.

The field to the east of the Gafenni and Usk confluence appeared to have a number of curvilinear hollows. These may be silted palaeo-channels around a bowl that fills with water during particularly wet periods. West of the pond a semi-circular ditch or channel encloses an area near the Gafenni footbridge. These earthworks are probably best interpreted as riverine features. West of the footbridge across the Gafenni a number of curvilinear earthworks between the Cibi River and the Gafenni may also be the result of silting and flooding episodes along this floodplain but it is possible that these could be manmade. The footpath alongside the water drain appears to cut across these hollow like features. West of the drain an approximately 120m long and 20m wide linear hollow may represent further flooding and silt deposition on this floodplain that is no more than 40m from the Usk riverbank. The field between the drain and Mill Street Industrial Estate has rows of young planted saplings that appear to be planted across some possible northeast to southwest aligned relict ridge and furrow. A medieval Fulling Mill is recorded within the HER at this point although, with the exception of the nearby earthworks mentioned above, no evidence of this could be seen on the ground.

The central Castle Meadows has several water filled depressions with reed growth and what appears to be Willow, Birch and Alder trees. The level grassland to the west of Castle Meadows and marked Marsh on contemporary maps is currently flooded in its central area. The site boundary in front of Linda Vista Gardens is defined by Metal Estate Fencing topped with barbed wire. An earthwork adjacent to Linda Vista Gardens and running south-west towards the Usk is possibly the remains of the channel indicated on the 1888 map. To the northwest of this feature a dump of modern building debris is located south of modern housing partly enclosed by wooden paneled fencing (fig.?). The northern end of the Usk Bridge on the far western boundary of Site A has a number of stone built culverts built under a brick archway. No other features of archaeological interest were observed.

Site B (figs 16-17 and 19): It is proposed that this site is used as a camping site for Eisteddfod visitors. This site was difficult to access due to a single lane providing heavy goods vehicular access to the sewage farm. No obvious public footpaths could be located. The western field has a fenced sheep pen located adjacent to the locked gate from the access road (fig.) The rise in the centre and western side of the field masked views of the lower northern side adjacent to the Usk. The second field on its eastern side was a wide level open area of grassland surrounded by mature hedgerows. The sewage works on its eastern edge is enclosed by mesh stockade fencing and masked by tree growth and hedgerows. The small fields alongside the A465 and south of the sewage farm access road were level fields and were flanked on their southern side by a water-filled ditch. These fields appeared to have covered inspection holes but access could not be gained to ascertain their function.

The curving narrow field behind the sewage farm had one potential archaeological feature approximately 170m north of the pipe and footbridge across the Usk. A 15m wide possible hollow-way was observed running north-west between the Usk river bank and the northern field boundary. This is broadly the location of the former field boundary on the tithe map and crop change on the 1969 aerial photograph. It is possible that the tithe field boundary and differential crop usage may reflect this hollow way that possibly led to an old crossing point of the Usk or river access for some other reason.

4. Discussion and Conclusions

This assessment was prepared in advance of an application for the two sites to provide the temporary location of the National Eisteddfod in August 2016.

Site A is on natural floodplain and contains evidence for palaeo-river channels and other possible evidence of historic flooding and gravel deposition events. Some earthworks noted to the south of Mill Street Industrial Estate may be manmade but could also be riverine features. The site is adjacent to three Scheduled Ancient Monuments but outside the scheduled boundaries and therefore there will be no physical impact on these monuments. Although there will be visual impact to the setting of Usk Bridge and Abergavenny Castle this will be limited to the preparation time, festival period of one week and the deconstruction period following the festival. A similar conclusion can be drawn for the two adjacent Historic Parks and Gardens. It is the opinion of this report that any ground disturbance activities near Usk Bridge and Linda Vista Park, which share borders with Site A, should be avoided.

The Llanfoist site (B) can be described as mainly riverbank grazing and enclosed fields bordering the sewage works and A465. Some field names reflect possible old flooding episodes with the name 'Ynys' (Island) replacing 'field'. A possible hollow way was observed on the Usk bank on the eastern side of the site. This may be associated with a removed field boundary or possibly reflect the former boundary following an old track to and from the Usk. No tithe field name evidence could be discovered to confirm this interpretation. Although access was limited during the site visit there is no cartographic or historical evidence to suggest the presence of any significant archaeological features that would be impacted by its temporary use during the Eisteddfod.

To conclude, with the exception of a possible hollow way on the eastern side of Site B, there appear to be no clear or significant archaeological features on the sites examined in this assessment.

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
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
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
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
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
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























Site B outlined in red on the Llanfoist tithe map (1844)



SUMMARY Benedictine priory (of conventual status), founded 1087-1100. The only surviving part of the claustral buildings is a single 14th century wall running eastwards from the southeast corner of the south transept and now forming part of the parish centre. The associated Tithe barn, which retains inserted 18th century round windows, has been restored and converted as a part of the community centre.

DESCRIPTION The Priory Church is now used as the parish church, St Mary's. The site of Priory House (converted from the monastic buildings and later demolished in 1953) has recently been redeveloped as the Priory centre. The associated Tithe barn, which retains inserted 18th century round windows, has been restored and converted as a part of the community centre (Bowden and Roberts 2012). Benedictine priory (of conventual status), founded 1087-1100 as a daughter house of St Vincent, Le Mans, by Hamelin of Ballon, Lord of Abergavenny. Seized as an alien priory in 1294, and dissolved in 1536 when the priory church (PRN 02338g) was acquired by the townspeople as a parish church. This church is variously reported as `entirely rebuilt and apparently contains none of the old features except a few monuments' (Bradney, 1907, 364), and `appears to date from the 16th century but was virtually entirely rebuilt in 1905 by Crawshay Bailey II' (1995 Quinquennial Survey, following Guy and Smith1979, 3); Bailey's restoration is dated more credibly to 1873 by a plaque in the church, and there therefore seems to have been a further restoration in 1905-6, to which the W window belongs. However, examination of the nave walls suggests that the picture is much more complex and the church may retain significant portions of fabric predating the Late Perpendicular N window. Examination of the fabric is considerably hampered by the ribbon pointing used on much of the masonry; though the clarity of detail varies from area to area. Since this church is scheduled for a major structural overhaul within the next few years, it would be advisable to take advantage of the work on raking out and repointing to undertake a thorough archaeological survey of the masonry, which should help to resolve this matter. The N wall of the nave appears to be substantially earlier than the rest of the surviving work, since it includes, as a secondary feature, a small window with a semicircular head, which has been built into the blocking of an earlier small rectangular opening, possibly a slit from which the dressings have been removed. This wall has a straight joint with the rood-stair bay, from which its masonry differs; it is possible that the addition of the rood stair was part of a restructuring which also involved the insertion of the nave N window in the 15th/16th century. The window itself appears may have been inserted over another earlier opening. Since the most clearly visible section of straight joint is significantly below the window sill, it is possible that it may have been a door, though as there is patching around this window it is difficult to be completely certain given the current sate of the walls. It is possible that the S porch may have been added at this time to replace a N door, as both porch doors are of 15th/16th century type, though both have been reset when the porch was rebuilt, following the reconstruction or refacing of the porch in the 19th century. There is the remains of a blocked opening over the present door between porch and nave, suggesting that there may originally have been a window

in this position. The shape of the priest's door suggests that it may also have been of similar date, but the other openings in the chancel are either Victorian or have been renewed more recently (see below). The bellcote openings suggest a later 16th or early 17th century date; the bellcote was obviously taken down when the W wall of the nave was heightened, and was carefully reassembled above the new parapet. The S windows of the nave are of later 17th century type, although one appears to be a complete Victorian renewal. There appear to have been two phases to the Victorian/Edwardian rebuild, as the W wall and clasping buttresses employ a different type of masonry from that used in other rebuilt sections (the vestry, porch and part of the chancel). The W end of the nave is in coursed rubble, but is distinguishable from the earlier masonry in the N and S walls of the nave and the N and lower part of the E walls of the chancel, which are in squared, rock-faced blocks of sandstone laid in snecked courses. Windows with limestone dressings (W window, E window, nave SE, chancel SE) must also date to the rebuild, though it is not always clear whether they were new windows or replacements foe earlier windows of the same or smaller size in the same position. The SW window of the chancel has had its jambs partly renewed, and its head completely renewed more recently, thus making this window more difficult to assess. It became the parish church after the dissolution of the priory. The church lies to the N of the priory cloister (Lawler 1995, Lawler and Marvell 1995). The church consists of nave, separate chancel, N aisle, N and S transepts, two chapels of which one is now used as the vestry and organ chamber, central crossing tower, and W porch. The nave and N aisle are parallel and of nearly equal height and width, divided by an arcade supported on compound piers; both have arches at the E end, the one at the end of the nave giving access to the crossing under the central tower, which also has arches to both transepts and the chancel. The N transept opens to the N aisle, with the N walls of the aisle and transept on the same line. The S transept projects beyond the church and its line is continued by a range of priory domestic buildings; there has also been a building against the N wall of the N transept, as evidenced by the crease of its roof, and it is therefore unclear whether the window in this wall is of entirely of Victorian construction, or whether it replaced an earlier one which had been blocked by this building. The chancel is separated from the chapels by arcades supported on heavy square piers similar to those at the crossing. The porch is of three bays, separated by doors; the main entrance is in the central bay, under a gable, and the side bays give access respectively to the nave and N aisle. The building seems to have been constructed mainly between the end of the 13th century and the end of the 14th century, although it is possible that some of work may have been carried out as a result of the damage inflicted on the priory by Owain Glyndwr (Robinson 1993, 45). Interpretation is hampered by extensive campaigns of rebuilding in 1882 and 1896, by the heavy pointing and remains of rendering still to be seen on parts of the medieval fabric, together with the painting of the piers of the arches in the crossing and the area to the E; and by the renewal of all the windows with the exception of four blocked windows in the chancel and Lewis chapel, of which only one retains its tracery, and the head of the E window. This last has been described as Norman (Gilbert nd, 16), but it is very wide and extremely slender. It may more plausibly be interpreted as Perpendicular, although the present Perpendicular tracery was put in 1922 when the window was restored to its former size, after having been reduced in 1828 to allow the chancel ceiling to be lowered (loc cit, and Sproule-Jones 1968, 11). The blocked window on the N wall of the Lewis Chapel suggests a date of the late 13th/early 14th century for this part of the building, which is consistent with the larger (renewed) window on this wall, and the arcades: the E window in this chapel is an insertion. The tower appears to be 14th century, as it has ogee-headed windows, it may therefore be slightly later be slightly later than the chapels; the masonry too is clearly distinguishable. The partial blocking of the first-floor lights in the tower by the chancel and N transept roofs indicates that these must originally have been lower, or at least of

lower pitch. It is possible that the chancel clerestory is in fact an addition, as might be suggested by the difference in masonry of the N wall. What little can be seen of the clerestory windows (probably two each side) suggests that they date rather later than the original construction of the E end and were part of the presumed Perpendicular refenestration of the church. Restorations of the 19th and 20th century are reasonably well documented. The main effect of the restoration of 1828 was to remove the central arcade between the nave and N aisle to provide single space surrounded by galleries and covered by a new roof of single span, and also to lower the chancel roof (with concomitant reduction in size of the E window) and effectively cut the chancel off from the nave. In 1874 Gilbert Scott was commissioned to report on the state of the fabric and propose measures to restore the church to its medieval form. Some, though not all, of his proposals were adopted over the course of a series of restorations in 1882, 1896, 1911 and 1922 (Gilbert nd, 16); it is possible that at least some work was carried out shortly after the report was made, although this is not recorded by Gilbert; a lapse of eight years between proposals for works and their being carried out was not normal in the Victorian period, and Scott noted at that the window in the Herbert chapel had badly decayed mullions and tracery which urgently needed renewal. If this is the case, the renewal of the windows in the S wall of the nave and the insertion or enlargement of the windows in the N and S walls of the nave (not mentioned in Glynne's description of 1836: Glynne 1902, 81-3), all of which are in the same limestone, may have taken place at the same time. The 1882 restoration saw the rebuilding of the nave and N aisle, with a new arcade between them, and the construction of a new W porch/narthex. The S wall of the nave does not appear to have been greatly affected by these changes; it still retains much of its early masonry, and the windows, which retain elements of their ?original dressings were probably at a different date. The masonry used in this campaign of restoration was a distinctive Victorian style featuring squared rock-faced blocks set in snecked courses with dressings of a medium-grained sandstone streaked with red and yellowish-fawn. The 1896 restorations concentrated on the chancel and chapels, and it is possible that the renewal of windows using limestone, if not done in the 1870s, dates to this period, since it involved major work in the chancel. The construction of a new vaulted ceiling in the chancel should also be linked to the raising of the roof. The lower part of the tower, within the church, took place in 1911, although the upper part had to wait until 1950. The E window in the chancel was restored and provided with new tracery in 1922, and the N transept window built in 1954, replacing an earlier window noted by Col Symonds in 1645 (GRO D992.4); the dressings of both windows used the same stone as that employed in the 1882 restorations (Sproule-Jones 1968, 11). Further restorations and renovations took place in the 1960s, but are not so clearly visible in the fabric, and a campaign of restoration of the monuments in the Herbert Chapel was taking place at the time of this survey; archaeological investigation forms a part of this work (Locock 1994a and 1994b; Page 1994). The most notable fittings in the church are the Norman font bowl, the 15th century choir stalls (Crossley and Ridgway 1959, 20-8) and the extensive collection of monuments. The monumental sculpture is currently being restored (in the Herbert Chapel and S transept, which are thus not open to full inspection); but includes medieval and post-medieval effigies, published by Bradney, and a rare wooden sceptre of Jesse from a Jesse Tree. The monuments elsewhere in the church are much as noted by Bradney, other than the flat slabs in the floors, which are largely ignored by him, and some of the wall plaques, which have changed position. Fragments of wallpainting with heraldic devices have been found in the Herbert Chapel behind one of the tombs against the S wall (Per com F Olding). The wall plaster was photographed and then drawn at 1:1 in situ, marking areas of damage, paint, and plain disaster. Heights were measured from the finished floor height (at 55.76m OD) (Locock 1997).
